THE LATEST: Glaser was recognized as one of the top 100 lawyers by the Daily Journal in 2020, and her firm ranked No. 9 on the Los Angeles Ethics Commission's list of Top 10 Highest Paid Lobbying Firms. In October, Glaser represented MME Pasadena Retail Inc., a subsidiary of marijuana company MedMen, in suing the city of Pasadena for denying its application for a retail space.

BACKGROUND: Glaser's clients have included major Hollywood studios, Fortune 500 companies, real estate investors and developers, financial institutions, and high-profile public figures such as Kirk Kerkorian, Keith Olbermann and Conan O'Brien. Glaser clerked for U.S. District Judge David Williams after graduating from Rutgers Law School. She serves on several nonprofit boards and contributes to local charities including Center Theatre Group and Geffen Playhouse. Glaser also serves on the community advisory board at the UCLA Y&S Nazarian Center for Israel Studies.

THE LATEST: Goldstein was included on the Business Journal's Leaders of Influence: Litigators & Trial Lawyers list for the second year in a row in 2020. His litigation work includes unfair competition disputes, partnership and shareholder claims, right of publicity, and privacy and the First Amendment. In the past year, Goldstein has been a guest lecturer at USC, UCLA, and Southwestern Law School, teaching topics including submission law, right of publicity, claims against talent agents and managers, alternative dispute resolution, and remedies for litigation misconduct.

BACKGROUND: Goldstein launched his career at Katten Muchin Rosenman. He then spent 10 years at O'Melveny & Myers, followed by seven years at Carlsmith Ball. Goldstein has represented Fortune 500 companies and entertainment industry businesses in commercial and intellectual property matters. He has a BA from Brandeis University and a JD from USC's Gould School of Law.

JOHN HUESTON

THE LATEST: In 2020, Hueston was the co-lead trial counsel representing Amazon.com Inc. managers in a two-week trial in which eBay Inc. accused the company of trying to poach its sellers. Hueston obtained a complete defense judgment for Amazon, nullifying the claim against the company. He also is the president of the Social Justice Legal Foundation's board. In January, he was named one of the Daily Journal's Top Lawyers of the Decade.

BACKGROUND: Hueston, who founded Hueston Hennigan with Brian Hennigan in 2015, earned acclaim in the U.S. Attorney's office when he served as co-lead prosecutor in the case against executives at Enron Corp. He also secured a \$5.15 billion settlement after a 2012 trial on behalf of the Tronox Trust against Anadarko Petroleum Corp. and Kerr-McGee Corp. for environmental liabilities. Hueston's clients have included Bill Koch, Elon Musk, Alec Baldwin and Fortune 500 companies such as Amazon, PricewaterhouseCoopers and Caltech.

MACK JENKINS

Chief of the Public Corruption & Civil Rights Section

THE LATEST: Jenkins is the lead prosecutor in the federal government's case against former Los Angeles City Councilmember Jose Huizar, who is accused of taking bribes in the form of political contributions from real estate developers. It's considered one of the largest public corruption cases in history. In 2020, Jenkins charged 11 defendants as part of the sweeping investigation. He also resolved bribery investigations into two additional corporate entities that paid a total of \$2.2 million in fines.

BACKGROUND: Jenkins was appointed chief of the Public Corruption and Civil Rights Section for the U.S. Attorney's Office in Los Angeles in 2017 after serving as deputy chief. He is a graduate of Yale Law School and joined the office in 2008. He personally prosecutes and supervises the prosecution of some of the most high-profile and sensitive matters in the Justice Department, including corruption, fraud against the justice system, civil rights violations by federal and local law enforcement, hate crimes, election integrity, Foreign Agents Registration Act violations, kleptocracy, and Foreign Corrupt Practices Act matters.
